

Your Summer Plan for Reading Success

is too, so we've developed a plan that includes learning and fun. Youcan use this color-coded calendar each month this summer to keep your child's mind and body active and engaged. Here is how an ideal summer month with Istation may look:





Five Things Parents Can Do This Summer to Help Children This Fall

Research shows that children who read fluently do better in school. It's not just teachers who make it happen, though. Parents play a key role, too. The "summer slide" is the documented learning loss that occurs when students are out of school. Experts say that reading just five books during the summer months can help. Here are five new, easy-to-implement ideas for parents, grandparents, and guardians.

How to Be a Reading Role Model:

- 1) **Show. Don't tell.** Let your children see you read. It doesn't matter what you read a book, a magazine, an online article just as long as your children see you engaged with text.
- 2) Have a family game night.
 Playing games like Scrabble,
 Boggle, Pictionary, and
 Scattergories can teach spelling,
 vocabulary, and communication
 skills.
- 3) Eat dinner as a family without TV or phones. (That's a tall order, we know!) With older kids, focus on a good conversation. Talk about what went on that day or about what's planned for the

rest of the week. For younger children, try to incorporate word games like "I spy something that rhymes with..." or "Name a synonym for..." Make dinner fun and help your children become good conversationalists!

- 4) Keep track of it all. Mark a calendar with the amount of time your children spend reading (and working on Istation, of course) each day. At the end of the summer, add up the hours. When school begins again, encourage your children to tell their teachers how much time they spent reading over the summer. Teachers will be thrilled and your children will feel proud!
- 5) Ask questions. Whether your children are reading or using electronics, engage them with questions. This will help boost their critical thinking skills while providing you with an opportunity to bond. For great questions to ask, check out the next page.

Teachers will be quite happy in the fall if you implement a few of these ideas over the summer.

Television Can Become a Teaching Tool

There's more to literacy than just the ability to read. A critical part of reading is learning how to think as you read.

The good news is that asking your children questions can boost this key literacy skill. Before, during, or after your children read a story, article, or book, you can ask:

- What is it about?
- What do you think will happen next?
- Does this make you wonder about other things?
- What is your favorite part of the story?
- What did you learn?
- Do the characters change over time? If so, how?
- What is the problem in the story?
- What is the solution?

Summer is a great time to position reading as a relaxing activity that can be fun for the whole family.

It can be hard to tear kids away from the television, especially during the hot summer days.

Instead of surrendering to the allure of mindless screen time, you can make TV your literacy partner! Here area a few ideas:

- Look through the programming guide and have your children select the show (or shows) they want to watch that day. Then have your children make a persuasive "speech" as to why they should be permitted to watch.
- After the show (perhaps at mealtime), ask your children to give a report by recounting the plot, describing the characters, and explaining any moral or lesson in the story.
- Ask what they liked or didn't like about the program and suggest they script an alternate ending.

Who knows? Your encouragement might inspire the development of the next great screenwriter or inventor!




Go Places with Reading

Take Five This Summer

Reading five books during summer vacation can halt "The summer slide" and improve literacy skills!

Research proves summer learning loss happens, but there is also research to prove it can be prevented.

When Istation took part in a recent "Summer Reading Summit" in Hillsborough County, Florida, much of the discussion centered on keeping kids interested in reading when they aren't being compelled to read in school.

John Milburn, the Supervisor of Library and Media Services for kindergarten through 5th grade in Hillsborough County Public Schools, gave some good advice.

"I remind students that this is the time of year they finally get to read whatever they want to read. It's all their choice," he said.

Milburn quoted research conducted by Harvard, which shows that r eading just five books during the summer break can have a significant impact on keeping learning loss at bay. That means it only takes one book every couple of weeks to make a difference. So, take five with your kiddos this summer! Cut out this list and pin it to your refrigerator so you don't forget. Remember to celebrate whenever your child completes a book too!


Istation's Foldable Bookmarks

These bookmarks are designed to hold your child's place in any book while reminding them that reading should be fun.






